

Rector's Page: What are you giving up for your personal Lord this Lent?

In just over two weeks on February 18, Ash Wednesday, Lent begins with a bidding for us to observe a Holy Lent. We are invited like generations of Christians before us to prepare for the Reaffirmation of our Baptismal Covenant and witness to the Life of Christ, Crucified, Died, Risen and Ascended as well as the Coming of the Holy Spirit after fulfilling the truth proclaimed in all the Law and Prophets.

What may observing a Holy Lent in anticipation of Reaffirmation look like for you? Are you like many other Catholics who choose to practice a spiritual discipline and renew their rule of life throughout the 40 days and 40 nights of the Lenten Sojourn? As Episcopalians we are most definitely “lower case c” Catholics, which means that Lent is a time for renunciation, repentance, and renewal of the soul for more life and to ultimately learn to love like God Who is passionate toward all of humanity.

As Lent begins it is our individual decision to observe a Holy Lent and thereby to follow Jesus the Christ to His most Holy Cross on Calvary's ridge, just outside the gates of the Holy City, Jerusalem of Judea. I always like to remind folks during this season, that it is an individual decision to follow Christ to the Cross and by doing so we bear our crosses, as such. Yet, the Paschal Outcome is not customized for individuals who merit a just desert and heavenly reward. No, everyone is fulfilled in the Light of Christ, Risen and Ascended. Grace prevails in the end and if it isn't grace-filled, well it's not the end, so keep going in faith on this one precious life journey.

So, what will you be giving up for Lent? Remember, that to give up something or someone for Lent means you are intending to observe a Holy Lent. For almost three quarters of Lent you will be giving up your rector/priest/pastor. Perhaps, you are trying to lose a few more pounds before summer and you can give up sweets or even sugar. But, remember that you are making an offering and sacrifice to God that is pleasing to Him whose only begotten Son, Jesus Christ, offered the ultimate on a lonely wooden cross.

What is the only thing in light of Christ Jesus as our personal Lord that would be pleasing to God Almighty, Our Father Who Art in Heaven? Psalm 51 verse 18 says, “The sacrifice of God is a troubled spirit, a broken and contrite heart, O God, you will not despise.” “Offer to God a sacrifice of thanksgiving, and make good your vows to the Most High,” says Psalm 50:14. Mercy and Peace be with you all.

Thoughts from the back pew: February, 2015

Status Quo or Stratosphere?

The past couple of weeks I have received an education on international shipping, a subject I had not thought about much despite working for an international company the past 4 years. With the recent change my company made by moving all sales for underground projects to a new joint venture that I am a part of, our way of doing business has undergone a radical change. Previously, all I had to do was to look up what and how much of each product was stored in the warehouse, submit an order and the product was delivered to the customer. Now, with the change, the product is shipped from overseas in containers directly to the customer with no warehousing involved. It all seemed to be pretty straight forward. Until, of course, the ‘incoterms’ started showing up. What are incoterms you ask? They are the magic three letter codes that govern all international shipping. I think many of us have heard of FOB (free on board) but how about DAT (delivered at terminal), DAP (delivered at place) or, DDP (delivered duty paid)? With DAT the container is basically set off the boat on the dock and with DDP it is delivered to your door with all the duty and taxes paid, big difference! I spent three days this week talking to customs brokers, tax remediation specialists, shipping companies and freight forwarders because a clerk had labeled a shipment DAP instead of DDP, again big difference! Needless to say it has been a big change for both me and my customers. Last week I had an air freight shipment going from Belgium to a potash mine just outside Saskatoon, Canada. I could hear the confusion in my customer’s voice when I told him I needed him to sign a power of attorney so that my customs broker could act on his behalf with Canadian Customs before the shipment could be loaded on a truck and leave the airport in Calgary.

I’ve also had several customers who don’t want to make the change they are comfortable with the old way of doing things, after all that’s the way it’s always been. However, when they learn they will save anywhere from \$2,000 to \$4,000 per shipment because the product doesn’t get unloaded then reloaded and shipped twice they are generally OK with making the switch.

All of this along with the discussions at the annual meeting got me thinking. Just how much are we all really open to change? We say we are, but honestly, I think we all get comfortable with the way things are and unless something comes along and shakes things up we are mostly content with the status quo. I think this applies to not just individuals but also companies and organizations like St. Luke’s too. I think we are trying to service 21st century needs with a 20th century system and, just like my company and our customers we have to learn new ways “to get the product to market”. How do we balance the needs of the Sunday morning folks who basically pay the bills with the needs of the diocese and our church outreach programs: TTEM, the Wednesday night children’s garden and The Outlet that all need our support? How do we step up and get from DAT and simply dropping things off the side of the boat to DDP and delivering what is needed, where it’s needed at the right time? I think for me, I believe that we all need to reflect on how much St. Luke’s and the work we do here means to each of us and individually decide which of those works we are willing to go above and beyond what we have done in the past to support. Maybe we need a new approach to funding, or not. Maybe we all just need to dig a little deeper, or not. Maybe the status quo is fine. One thing I learned this past week is that change is inevitable and it’s better to be to learn something new than to be left behind.
